#### School's Challenge

Last Year's NW Regional Heat of the School's Challenge was won by Altrincham Grammar School for Boys, and the same team went on to win the National Competition at Burlington House! The school also won the prize of hosting the 2020 Regional Heat, which took place on 25th February 2020.

There was amazing effort from both teams. Aquinas presented on "Accurate Representation of Dinosaurs in the Media: Why Jurassic Park is Incorrect" and Altrincham Grammar School For Boys presented on "Bowland Shale Hydrocarbons". Both were excellent presentations - I am continually amazed by how professional the students of this age (lower sixth form) are!!

Aquinas won the poster and presentation rounds but were narrowly defeated overall by the quiz round !!

Congratulations to Altrincham Grammar School For Boys who went through to the National finals at Burlington House. Unfortunately. the final had to be cancelled and moved online. Students submitted a copy of their posters and a recording of their Heats presentation. They also took part in the quiz as a livestream on the day the final was meant to take place. Of 10 schools who made it to the Final, 8 managed to submit.

Altringham GSB have the following report "The final was held but remotely. We were sent the quiz and then had to complete it in a 1 hour time slot. We recorded our presentation and then put it on youtube and sent the link to GeolSoc. We also made our poster and sent this to the Geolsoc. Unfortunately, we got nowhere and won none of the prizes".

#### Lecture Series 2019/20

Our first lecture was in September from Professor Cynthia Burek and Dr Rosalind Todhunter on "Geoconservation and Cheshire's Geodiversity Sites" at the University of Chester (Attendance: 20).

Professor Jonathan Chambers presented our November lecture at Birchwood as a joint meeting with the ICE NW Group on "Priming The Industry: An Innovation in Earthworks Monitoring" (Attendance 40).

Our next lecture was "Geology and Geodynamics of the Betic Cordilleras, South East Spain" at Manchester University, a joint meeting with the Manchester Geological Association (Attendance 43).

We attended a second joint meeting in Birchwood with the ICE NW Group on "Reclaiming the Emerson's Green

Landfill to Enable Residential Development" by Duncan Scott of Vertase FLI Ltd (Attendance 49).

In January, Paul Colbeck, of Geoshield, spoke on "Ground Gas Membranes" at Manchester University (Attendance 61).

In what was to be our final face to face lecture for 2020, Iain Henrys delivered a lecture on "Exploration for a sub-sea coal deposit and the impacts of the 2010 M8.8 Earthquake, Chile", on the anniversary of the event, 27th February, at Liverpool University, a joint event with the Liverpool Geological Association Group (Attendance 24).

Our lectures and fieldtrips for the rest of the year were subsequently cancelled due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, but in April, David Wilshaw was the first to take the plunge and present online with his lecture "The Engineering Geology of Florida: A Guide to Managing Ground Risk in the Sunshine State" (Attendance 90). #### **Zoom Room FAQs**

1. How do I get a link?

Sign up by following the instructions on the flier or on the meeting's page on the geol soc website. There will be a registration link to click on. You will be sent an email after you have registered with a link to join the meeting.

2. Can I give my link to all my mates?
We will be able to see who has shared their link.
We will record your CPD using your registration details, so if you have shared the link then this isn't possible.

3. What happens if the registration is full? We will try to arrange a livestream if demand is sufficient. Contact the secretary if you have problems with registration.

### Geological Society Code of Conduct for Meetings and other Events (inc Online)

- The Geological Society of London is a professional and learned society, which, through its members, has a duty in the public interest to provide a safe, productive and welcoming environment for all participants and attendees of our meetings, workshops, and events regardless of age, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, race, ethnicity, religion, disability, physical appearance, or career level.
- This Code of Conduct applies to all participants in Society related activities, including, but not limited to, attendees, speakers, volunteers, exhibitors, staff, service providers, representatives to outside bodies, and applies in all GSL activities, including ancillary meetings, events and social gatherings.

#### Breach of the Code of Conduct

- If an incident of proscribed conduct occurs either within or outside the Society's premises during an event, then the aggrieved person or witness to the proscribed conduct is encouraged to report it promptly to a member of staff or the event's principal organiser.
- Once the Society is notified, a member of staff or a senior organiser of the meeting will discuss the details with the individual making the complaint. Any witnesses who have been identified, and then the alleged offender will be consulted before determining an appropriate course of action.
- Confidentiality will be maintained to the extent that it does not compromise the rights of others.
